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#### THE RECORDING BUG

For some of us, it's inevitable—sooner or later, whether we write our own songs or just get good at playing songs already out there, we decide to make a CD. This decision is encouraged by friends or listeners saying, "Boy, that song was really great. Do you have a CD?" You start to think, "Hey, maybe I should have something to share, or even sell!"

The search begins for an engineer and a studio, where your musical efforts will be acknowledged. You want to have confidence that you will sound as good as you can, or hopefully, even better! So you book time and show up with your instrument of choice, and the fun begins.

You first find out that the best way to do your recordings is to lay down "tracks"—maybe guitar first, then voice, then other instruments to create the desired sound. The guitar track is often done to a "Click" or a "Click Track" This is an often obnoxious rhythmic sound, say a cowbell or a car horn playing on the beat, similar to the sound of the worst sounding but most accurate drummer you have ever heard. The idea is to play your song on the guitar to that beat, doing the song 3 or 4 times through, so that the best parts of your playing can be combined into one really good guitar track.

This same process, minus the click track (because now you just sing or play other instruments), is now used to create the vocal track and other instrumental tracks. This process allows these digital tracks to be sent to say, London or Mississippi, so that artists there can play along and be recorded on your CD. All of this studio time and sending of things back and forth can add up in the money department, not to mention the costs for the time of those far away artists in London or Mississippi.

What I've so far described is, with variations, the formal way of recording your CD. However, many singer-songwriters and other folk musicians opt for more economic ways of getting their music out there. Apple's GarageBand and other sound mixing programs make home productions possible. Folks still find out that high quality microphones and quiet locations make a big difference in the final sound. It doesn't hurt to have someone with a good, well-trained ear put all the pieces together no matter how they were recorded. Mixing processes are tricky and can be costly, but the expense can be worth it when you're creating a permanent record of your work. The real trick is to let the recording process enhance your music and not get in the way of your real sound.

These workshops will be led by a variety of notable local fiddle players, focusing on different styles. # Having Trouble Tuning in to KRSH 95.9 fm?



Next, we got "TuneIn Radio" installed on the I-phone, chose KRSH from the "local stations" directory, and voilà! -- live streaming KRSH on our home stereo without static! It's been years since we had been able to hear local radio this clearly. Thank you, Son! Certainly, there are many other apps that allow you to enjoy radio broadcasts from all over the country, so you don't necessarily need a certain kind of phone; you just need to take advantage of internet radio.

Use your kid or your grandkid or your neighbor's kid, but get it done and enjoy listening to Bowker, Sala and the rest of the gang. Remember that Sala's KRSH Uncorked program is on Sunday mornings, 8:00-11:00.

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# Late in the Game: Entering the World of Music at 50+ "Senior Dude Fun"

Looking back over the past 12 years as a singer-songwriter, I'm thinking it's been this old dawg's wild and satisfying ride....couldn't have written a better script for my later years. While it's true that I toured with a folk group in my college days in the mid-sixties, I had never written any songs until the millennium year. Since then, I've written and recorded 48 songs on four albums, and somehow got lucky enough to win and place in a few international songs contests, meet a host of music industry reps, radio personalities, publishers and A&R song pluggers, tour, and write songs with some extraordinarily talented friends. Consider this: when George Merrill, Multi-Platinum Grammy-Winning songwriter asked me (at an open mic) to write with him, I had to pinch myself to believe it was real. We've collaborated on 12 songs so far, with more in the works. George and I are reproducing the first song I ever wrote (concerning global warming), "Close To Home", in CSN style, to be used in promoting the good fight by environmental groups. Incidentally, we were able to board Graham Nash's bus in Sonoma (Sonoma Jazz Festival), since George and Graham also write together.

Lately I am also writing with San Franciscan Joel Evans of Cinemasters, who has more cuts on Film and TV than just about anyone around. We're working toward having some tunes ready for production. Think old-timey jazz up through Sinatra-style and show tunes. I am also proud to announce that I have credits in a film "Decoding Annie Parker" starring Helen Hunt, that is due to come out this fall. It's a Christmas story (and tune). I also write with my good buddy from Berkeley Grad school daze, Scott O'Brien, a very strong writer and poet with a recorded album from Sebastopol. Scotty and I occasionally do house concerts and other gigs together. My last album, "Gone West", charted in the top ten of Western Playlists in 2012, and I was able to play at last year's Santa Clarita Cowboy Fest.

One of the biggest surprises has been getting radio play around the world in my crazy-quilt genre mix: folk, folk-rock, Americana, country, western, pop, and jazz—a smorgasbord of music styles. Looking back, after playing hundreds of venues and touring throughout the Bay Area, Central California and the Northwest—well, it's all been one big bonus, meeting so many cool people along the way, and

sharing my tunes with both fans and total strangers, at house concerts, wineries, small festivals, coffee shops, farmers' markets, parties, etc. A third career! Who woulda' thunk?

I've had my share of good times in radio interviews, too. Thinking back... whoa! I remember how deeply frightened and embarrassed I was a dozen years ago, singing some early (crappy) songs at West Coast Songwriter events, where industry judges gave 10pts for music, 10 pts for lyrics, and the winner got some free studio time. After I started winning a few of those, I thought—well, it's working, even though there's a lot more to learn. These days, I can stand up in front of large crowds with confidence, and approach small house concerts with the same ease of delivery and performance chops, and have some great fun. Apparently, I'm a born storyteller (aka "ham") and I really enjoy engaging with the audience. There's certainly a big personal payoff, whether or not the money is significant.

Here's some credit where it's due: I have worked with singer-songwriter and songwriting teacher Steve Seskin, whose country hits are legend. Seskin also had roots in folk, and after 9 years of classes on and off, I've accepted his pointers in songwriting, and apply what I can. I guess you could say I love words; I'd call myself a wordsmith. I find that marrying the right melody with lyrics is both a daunting and thrilling challenge when it works out. A background in Poetry, Psychology and Counseling surely helps, but I think that long and varied life experience is the deepest well. Some songs take me years to write, others come quickly. Whether you write about humor, dogs, hats, love, mountains, history, or the West, being able to say what you really want to, and speaking of what really touches you, you are writing about particular periods in your life.

Although almost 70 years old, I'm having the time of my life! The opportunities and recognition have blown me away. I'm enjoying the many prizes and awards that I've earned in the folk/country/Americana songwriting community!



## Pick'n Pot Luck recipe

#### **Scalloped Summer Squash**

2 lbs summer squash (any type)

2 TB butter

3 TB grated onion

3/4 teas. salt

1/8 teas. pepper

#### **Topping**

1/2 cup fine cracker or bread crumbs mixed with 1 TB melted butter

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Steam or boil the squash until soft. drain well, then mash. Mix in all remaining ingredients except topping and spoon into a shallow, buttered 1 1/2 qt. casserole dish. Top with buttered crumbs. Bake, uncovered 25-30 minutes until lightly browned.

Easy variations: use herbed crackers or bread crumbs, add parmesan cheese.


